Dear Sirs,

I presume you are aware that I am a Spiritualist as is, or was, the case with all of the members of <sup>my</sup> Father's Family, excepting my <sup>late</sup> brother ~~William and Rowland~~ ~~My late brother Rowland~~ Rowland and William.
